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1. Study programme "Fine Arts"

Degree: Bachelor of Fine Arts

The interdisciplinary Bachelor degree "Fine Arts" encompasses all of the artistic and scientific subjects taught at this institution. Students can choose from a range of subjects: Sculpture, Stage Design, Design, Film, Photography and Graphic Art, Painting and Drawing, Theory and History of Art and Time-based Media, as well as numerous workshops and laboratory classes. Students are free to decide whether to combine several subjects or to concentrate on a single subject. This open structure guarantees maximum flexibility and allows students to determine the content of their studies in art and/or science themselves.

During their first two semesters, beginning students will receive extensive supervision and assistance in becoming familiar with forms and methods of working, as well as in determining which subjects to take in the following years. Eventually, the learning and research which is undertaken in the studios of this institution will be dictated by the student's own artistic intentions and by the interaction between individual artistic ideas and the practical considerations of planning and artistic work. Students will be assisted extensively during this process by assessment both within the group and in one-to-one conversation with tutors. At the same time the various scientific options on offer will help students to develop their plans for artistic development in detail, give them a theoretical dimension, and set them out in a judicious way and present them successfully to others. It is also possible to concentrate on scientific subjects. Knowledge of the materials and the principles of application of different techniques of working in art, as well as the necessary manual and technical skills can be gained in the numerous different artistic workshops.

Students will learn to develop work of their own which is experimental in a way which emphasises the aesthetic principles behind the work, the statement it makes and its strengths. They will be able to gain skills in craft processes which will enable them to express, refine and further develop a variety of artistic ideas. Students will be able to develop a knowledge of the history of art and theoretical concepts which will enable them to analyse and determine the state of development of their own artistic work and both increase and enhance their artistic productivity. Students taking a scientific subject will also learn to formulate theoretical problems, to develop an argument which traces their implications, and arrive at a conclusion or thesis.

Developing the ability to present one's own work to an audience, and to translate it into a variety of media is also an integral part of this study syllabus.

The normal amount of time needed to complete this degree is 8 semesters.

2. Content of study

Information and skills which are a necessary component of study will be transmitted during modules which are divided into three categories: "Orientation/Basics", "Artistic Development" and "Scientific Studies", and are supplemented by accompanying courses.

4. Departments and Modules

4.1 Sculpture

In its broadest sense, sculpture involves the process of aesthetic formation in space and includes practices such as the plastic arts, sculpture, installations, object art, conceptual art and performance. The Bachelor's degree course taught in the Department of Sculpture gives its students the opportunity to establish an independent artistic vision and reflect on and engage with practical and conceptual/theoretical issues of sculpture in the past, present and future.

The artistic categories covered by the course include all fields of sculptural design, from the conception of form to colour and space, including their manifold levels of modulation. Students are also required to engage with contemporary art theoretical discourses and a wide range of historical and contemporary visual and form languages. They investigate spatial and environmental relations, issues of sustainability and learn to situate their own artistic articulations and those of others in the specific socio-cultural context of their development. Learning and research on the degree course is structured by students' completion of an artistic development project, in which they work independently or in groups to develop their individual artistic vision through the interplay of practical and conceptual work. Practical sessions in the HFBK workshops and laboratories enable students to engage intensively with aspects of material and form and to acquire the design techniques requisite to the implementation of their artistic ideas. Working with a range of traditional materials – plaster, ceramics, plastics, wood and metal – they also learn 3D printing, media technology and electronics skills.

The interdisciplinary nature of the degree course provides students with the opportunity to engage with related disciplines, thereby situating their artistic endeavours within this broader methodological framework. The HFBK encourages and enables its students to widen their cultural horizons by spending part of their studies at a partner university abroad. We also provide our students with the opportunity to gather experience in a range of contexts both within and outside the art world. Working in an in-house setting – such as the HFBK annual exhibition and in-house gallery – and at events organized by external partners, students gain experience in the presentation, communication and discussion of artistic works. Supplementary courses taught in the Department of Theory and History enable students to explore a range of issues in art theory, history and method in further depth. Relating this to their own artistic vision and experience, students are able to establish their artistic approach and historical understanding.

4.2 Stage Design

Bachelor's students in the Department of Stage Design focus on the development of an independent artistic vision. Engaging in historical-critical reflection on a range of theoretical and practical issues relating to the design of theatrical spaces in different cultural contexts both past and present, students of the course learn to relate this focus to contemporary discourses on the development of theatre and issues of sustainable design. In so doing students endeavour to situate their work in the specific context of its development.

Individual and group work and research focuses on the design of stage spaces and spatial installations for scenic design in a theatre, musical theatre, film, television, online and performance context and within independent artistic projects. Students develop their skills by working on their artistic development project and benefit from teacher feedback at all stages from idea to realization, given in individual and group tutorials. Beginning at the concept stage, the realization process moves through the design and modelling stages and culminates in a stage-ready production. The process incorporates experimental working practices in spaces and digital worlds, digital design methods and performance.

Students are provided with training in the handicraft and technical skills requisite to this process including stage drawing, model making and photography, CAD, digital printing, digital image editing and video editing. Workshop sessions afford them the opportunity to practice and refine these skills using a range of materials (such as wood, metal, ceramics, printing, digital/materials, media technology and electronics, camera/lighting/sound). They also develop an analytical understanding of the various approaches to content and form involved in the areas of direction, dramaturgy, costume, lighting, sound and video.

In addition to the opportunity afforded to students to exhibit and communicate their own work at the HFBK annual exhibition and graduation exhibitions, the department maintains a number of cooperation agreements with institutions and independent practitioners in the art scene (such as Theaterakademie Hamburg, Thalia-Theater, Schauspiel Hamburg and Kampnagel) which provide our students with the opportunity to gather experience in the communication and discussion of works of art.

The HFBK also maintains a number of international exchange programmes and project cooperation agreements with various institutions throughout the world, which afford our students the opportunity to refine the insights gained into their chosen discipline by engaging with other cultural contexts. The fundamentally interdisciplinary nature of the degree courses taught at the HFBK enables our students to engage with related disciplines, thereby developing their artistic endeavours within a broader methodological framework.

Supplementary academic training enables students of this course to explore a range of issues in art theory, history and method. Relating this to their own experience, students are able to refine their artistic approach and historical understanding.

4.3 Design

Designers shape our society; in so doing, they assume responsibility for the future. In view of their vocation, students on the Bachelor's degree course taught in the Department of Design are encouraged to develop and refine their own questions about society, practical life and technological advances, whilst developing a design response to the challenges thereby identified. Seeking to facilitate this process, the Department of Design provides an experimental space in which to study.

The degree course aims to introduce its students to the various tasks of a designer and supports their individual artistic development and voyage of professional self-discovery. The course focuses on the practical questions raised by its students, which culminate in individual or group artistic development project. Working independently to structure their studies, students are supervised by the teachers in the various studios.

Students can also take classes taught in other HFBK departments to ensure that they establish their artistic expression on a broad base. The interdisciplinary theoretical teaching provided at the HFBK combines the presentation of historical knowledge with a range of contemporary issues such as ecological sustainability, cultural diversity and post-colonial strategies. This trains students to reflect on future-proof perspectives on art, design and society.

Students realize their artistic development projects in workshop sessions, where they also develop and refine a range of skills using various materials such as plaster, wood, ceramics, plastics, metal/fine metal, digital/material (3D printing), digital and analogue photography, media technology and electronics.

The HFBK places a particular focus on design in real-life contexts; to this end, the department maintains a number of cooperation agreements with private companies, non-profit organisations and public institutions. This enables our students to work on the conception and realization of both individual and group projects as well as gaining experience in a range of participatory design processes. The HFBK also maintains several international partnerships and project cooperation agreements through which our students are accorded the opportunity to gain experience in different social and cultural contexts.

The focus of the degree course on the presentation, communication and discussion of design approaches is given an outlet in the HFBK annual exhibition, excursions and a range of external workshops. Students are also given the opportunity to experiment with new forms of art and design presentation in the HFBK gallery.

4.4 Film

The Department of Film at the HFBK stands in the tradition of artistic auteur films, and seeks to train innovative filmmakers to take an independent approach to the development of their craft. In focusing on collaborative and experimental working practices, we encourage our students to take an independent and free-spirited approach to all facets of cinematic communication and interaction.

Working on the basis of a thorough grounding in the technical skills of filmmaking, the degree course maintains an inspiring space in which to test film language conventions, conduct developmental film experiments with a long-term impact and discuss the artistic, economic and political role of film in media realities. Students develop their skills by working on an artistic development project, and benefit from teacher feedback at all stages from idea to realization given in individual and group tutorials.

The degree course provides its students with the opportunity to experiment with analogue and digital film techniques and evaluate the project-appropriate use of existing techniques and approaches also in terms of sustainability. In completing individual and group film projects, they gain a grounding in the development of cinematic concepts and their artistic implementation. Student projects can involve both fictional and non-fictional films, as long as they seek to develop artistic authorship.

Students on the degree course also take seminars in film history and theory. Developing an overview of the development of the medium, they reflect on the changing articulation forms of film, especially in relation to time-related discourses. Workshop sessions enable our students to develop their technical film-making skills and realize their artistic development project. The interdisciplinary nature of the degree course provides students with the opportunity to engage with related disciplines, thereby locating their own artistic endeavours within a broader framework.

The HFBK also maintains a number of international exchange programmes and project cooperation agreements with various institutions throughout the world, which afford our students the opportunity to refine the insights gained into their chosen discipline by engaging with other cultural contexts.

Participation in the HFBK annual and graduate exhibitions and in a range of other contexts – including presentations of their films in the HFBK university cinema and public cinemas, national and international film festivals, television and a range of digital platforms – enables students to gather experience in the communication and presentation of artistic works and introduces them to the institutional and social dynamics of this practice.

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4.5 Graphic Art/Photography

The Bachelor's degree course seeks to support students in developing an original visual language through artistically productive engagement with all forms of analogue and digital graphics and photography. It focuses on the development of an experimental openness for the interdependence between texts, image, film and objects in analogue and digital space and which is characteristic for the department.

In their choice and combination of media forms, processes and representations, students are encouraged to question and push the boundaries of their medium. For example, they are encouraged to produce compositions in which graphic or photographic elements appear alongside other media in installations, prints, projections or digital spaces. Learning on the degree course is structured by students' completion of an artistic development project, in which they work independently or in groups to develop their individual artistic vision through the interplay of practical and conceptual work and relate it to current artistic positions.

The course supports students in reflecting on their artistic vision. By entering into a discourse with a wide range of cultural contexts, they are encouraged to contribute to cultural development. The wide range of international cooperation programmes and exchange formats maintained by the HFBK provide our students with opportunities for intercultural encounters and a change of perspective. The fundamentally interdisciplinary nature of the degree courses taught at the HFBK enables our students to engage with related artistic and academic disciplines.

Students are encouraged to take advantage of the considerable academic freedom extended to them to make use of the well-equipped HFBK workshop facilities. Here, they can gather valuable experience in various fields, such as reprographic technology, printing technology and interface or web design. Supplementary courses enable students to explore a range of issues of art theory, history and method. Relating this to their own experience, students are able to develop their artistic approach and historical understanding.

In addition to providing an opportunity to produce artistic works, the course enables students to develop communication and discussion skills tailored to the institutional and social context of the art sector. The annual HFBK exhibition, its in-house gallery, material publishing house and a wide range of partnerships with institutions, civil society actors and digital networks offer the opportunity to test and discuss issues of image/art presentation and reception. Workshops and guest lectures involving international artists, academics and other universities ensure that HFBK students remain at the heart of the international artistic discourse

4.6 Painting/Drawing

The Bachelor's degree course taught in the Department of Painting/Drawing gives its students the opportunity to establish an independent artistic vision and develop the skills of historical-critical reflection on a range of theoretical and practical issues concerning painting and drawing of the past, present and future.

Together, students are introduced to the fundamental technical, genre-specific, aesthetic and theoretical concepts of painting and drawing, which they explore through the realization of their own ideas and concepts. Students work with a range of forms, colours and surface designs and their wide ranging variations and combinations. They are also required to engage with contemporary art theoretical discourses, a wide range of historical and contemporary visual languages and issues of sustainability. They also learn to situate their own artistic articulations and those of others in the specific socio-cultural context of their development.

Students' learning and research is structured by the completion of their artistic development project, in which students work individually or as part of a group to develop a unique artistic vision through the interplay of practical and conceptual work. Students are introduced to painting and drawing techniques, printmaking (etching, lithography, screen printing, etc.) and digital image processing and development in special classes and practical courses. The interdisciplinary nature of the degree course provides students with the opportunity to engage with related disciplines, thereby situating their artistic endeavours within this broader methodological framework.

The HFBK encourages and enables its students to spend part of their studies at a partner university abroad. Students participate in projects conducted with museums, galleries and the HFBK gallery and annual exhibition to develop skills in the presentation, communication and discussion of artistic works.

Supplementary courses taught in the Department of Theory and History enable students to explore a range of issues in art theory, history and method in further depth. Relating this to their own artistic vision and experience, students are able to establish their artistic approach and historical understanding.

4.7 Time-based Media

The Bachelor's degree course taught in the Department of Time-Based Media develops artistic dramaturgies and specific practices for (inter-) media formation processes in all spatio-temporal dimensions. Focusing on the full range of contemporary digital media, internet art, virtual reality, sound, photography and film, and their nuanced circulatory worlds and installative or performative settings, the course stresses their interplay with traditional forms of artistic expression.

The degree course seeks to encourage the individual or collective development of artistic articulations, including its students' ability to reflect on and to situate their work in the specific socio-cultural context of its development. Beginning with their identity as students at a Hamburg art academy, HFBK students go on to explore a range of diverse forms of artistic practice and positioning. This is accompanied by engagement with multiple contemporary and historical discourses of art theory, media criticism, diversity and sustainability.

Learning and research on the degree course is structured by our students' completion of an artistic development project in which they develop their individual artistic vision through the interplay of practical and conceptual work. Students acquire and practice the analogue and digital technical skills requisite to their degree course in practical courses taught in the HFBK media technology and electronics workshop, the acoustics laboratory, the mixed media workshop, a range of computer laboratories and the digital / material workshop. This enables them to explore the possible techniques of design and composition, form, surface and space, virtuality and concretion, sound and tone, image and detail, object and environment, time and duration and integrate them in their individual conception. The interdisciplinary nature of the degree course provides students with the opportunity to engage with related disciplines, thereby locating their own artistic endeavours within a broader framework.

Supplementary courses in art history and theory enable students to gather experience and explore a range of issues in their chosen field in greater depth.

The HFBK also maintains a number of international exchange programmes and project cooperation agreements with various institutions throughout the world, which afford our students the opportunity to refine the insights gained into their chosen discipline by engaging with other cultural contexts. We place great importance on the involvement of various publics in artistic research at the HFBK and the communication and discussion of art in the context of the diverse institutional and societal contexts of its presentation. Students are accorded the opportunity to present and discuss their work in the HFBK gallery and annual exhibition, in projects conducted with external partners and various workshops and events.

4.8 Theory and History

The Bachelor's degree course taught in the Department of Theory and History addresses a range of issues drawn from art and cultural studies, art education, design history and theory, art history, art theories, aesthetic and curatorial theory, philosophy and media theory. It also addresses selected aspects of gender theory, post-colonial studies, commemoration studies and other relevant discourses such as perspectives on sustainability in various fields of art, culture and their institutions. Taking an interdisciplinary approach to questions raised at the intersection of art and academia, it is studied in conjunction with an artistic subject.

Depending on the chosen weighting of theoretical and historical studies within their degree course, within four years, the students of the course acquire:

- In-depth knowledge of historical and contemporary artistic practice and the theoretical discourses in the specified disciplines.
- The ability to relate different theoretical approaches to each other, to make them productive in an interdisciplinary manner and working independently, to develop their own, possibly new questions.
- The ability to make an independent contribution (in the form of a text, publication or project) to an art or culture theoretical discourse, thereby laying the foundation for a career in a profession related to art and art theory.

The degree course has a modular structure. The individual components of the course are heterogeneous in terms of content and yet interrelated, allowing them to be combined in a range of fashions so as to enable students to develop their own distinctive approach. This acts as the starting point for the central focus of the degree course on the conception, presentation and publication of theoretical works in a range of professional contexts such as the exhibition industry, cultural institutions, journalism and the media.

In seminars, interdisciplinary projects, publications and in collaboration with non-university institutions, students learn to take a collective approach to academic questions. The HFBK prioritizes international exchange with a range of partner universities and through participation in international academic projects.

 - Machining using appropriate tools and machines (e. g. sawing, cutting, turning on the lathe, drilling and filing)
 - Chipless machining (e. g. bending, cutting, finishing of edges, raising, embossing, casting)
 - Connective techniques (e. g. various types of soldering and how to use them, spotwelding, riveting)
 - Shaping techniques (e. g. cutting using a CNC (Computerised Numerical Control) lathe, turning on a lathe, vacuum moulding, silicone die-casting, making of wax models
 - Surface finishing techniques (e. g. matt finish, bead blasting, buffing, grinding, polishing)
- 2. Advisory and practical support in producing project work.

Learning aims:

In the introductory course basic skills will be developed for dealing with materials with different properties and using different techniques. This knowledge is intended as the basis for the planning and realisation of independent projects related to the individual's course of study.
